Commander the Hon Humphry Legge, 8th Earl of Dartmouth CVO, DSO, KPM, a British peer and police officer, was a Trustee of the Royal Orphanage Wolverhampton. from 1932 to 1935.



A Senior School House was named "Dartmouth" commemorating the many parts played over the years by the Earls of Dartmouth.

In 1928, Recognition as a girls' Efficient Secondary School and new wing added.

In 1928 a new wing was added to the girls' school to provide extra dormitories and two common rooms. It was opened by the Earl of Dartmouth on 26th July 1929.

It provided extra dormitories and two common rooms. It was officially opened by the Earl of Dartmouth on 26th July 1929. By March 1931 there were 224 boys and 112 girls in the school.



This plaque, formerly at the foot of the appropriate bed commemorated a donation to provide a bed for a soldier or sailor in perpetuity.

Major Hall Keys was a notable Freemason.

The photo here shows the school in the 1920s.



In June 1930 the Graiseley Old Hall estate owned by Mr. George Green was on the market. It was purchased by the orphanage in order to increase the size of the playing fields on the opposite side of Penn Road.
